Nevertheless, an attitude of submission to a husband's authority will be reflected in numerous words and actions each day which reflect deference to his leadership and an acknowledgment of his final responsibility - after discussion has occurred, where possible - to make decisions affecting the whole family. .~Wayne Grudem
